Michelle, Lyndsey and I meet some of the students from the Shepparton English Language Centre (SELC). We walked into the classroom of the primary aged students, approximately 15 students.

Each student was from different areas of the world, it was very interesting to find out where they were born and what language they spoke. I was so impressed that these young kids could speak multiple languages as well as speaking fluent English.

The class environment was very structured and respectful. The students addressed us by Miss Eliza, Miss Lyndsey and Mrs Sheehan.

The students had their own books to read, I also chose some books from the collection of books Michelle had been given. To begin with I felt quiet nervous, I stood at the front of the class while the students asked questions about me such as, "Where were you born?" "What sports do you like?" Lyndsey did the after me. We were split into groups of three and then I listened to the girls read their book, I then read a book back to them. Once finished, I then moved to the next two boys, who each read a book to me, I helped one of the boys to pronounce difficult words in his book. I read them both a book and then it was time for us to finish up. Listening is a skill I normally struggle with but I felt that I was able to pay complete attention to the students and get to know them.



On Friday the 8th of November, we went to the asylum in Beechworth.

Mayday Hills Hospital closed in 1995 after 128 years of operation and the most haunted place in Victoria.

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On the 3rd of December, four students from Shepparton Flexible Learning Centre were given the opportunity by La Trobe University to be given a tour of the Shepparton Campus as well as a tour of the Fryers Street GO TAFE facility. Facilitator Dani Gow (La Trobe University) spoke with the students about a range of options available to them, including pathways through TAFE and into University.

The students were engaged in a few activities, including a tour of the Allied Health facility, where they were able to practice CPR and see the simulation equipment that the La Trobe students work within their studies. La Trobe put on a lunch for the students from the Campus Café, followed by a demonstration of the Universities 'One Button Studio' where students can record video and audio presentations and projects for their studies.

The 'One Button Studio' has been offered to the Flex Centre to utilize, which presents a fantastic opportunity in 2020 for the Flexi Students in their VCAL projects. All students in attendance were impressed, and quite amazed at both the La Trobe and GO TAFE facilities, and intentions are to make an annual tour of both La Trobe and GO TAFE, so students at the Flexi Centre can see the possibilities that lie beyond their studies here at Shepparton Flex.

A group of 6 students were privileged and lucky enough to have a guided tour of parts of the Puckapunyal Army Base. This grand tour started with a tour of the Sergeant's Mess, as with each of our stops our tour guide was the knowledgeable and engaging Warrant Officer Class 2 Shaun Gibbons. During the tour of the Sergeant's Mess, WO2 Gibbons explained to us the significance of certain parts of the Mess and why particular tributes were placed in certain sections of the Mess. He explained the historical role of the cavalry and how the current Armoured Corps have been derived from the days of old.

Our next stop was the Australian Armour and Lighthorse Museum. Our students were full of amazing questions that were all taken and answered exceptionally well by our guide. Lachie enjoyed being able to sit in a tank commanders seat, while Jaxson enjoyed strolling through the variety of tanks on offer to be viewed. The Tank Museum and our guide stepped us through the evolution of the Australia Armoured Corps from World War 1 through to present day. We all enjoyed the tour of the museum and learned a huge amount about the history of armoured vehicles in the Australian Army.

After a short break for lunch, it was off to another site that is rarely, if ever visited, by the general public. The Gunnery Wing at Puckapunyal. In this section we were able to see what tank different tank rounds look like, were able to try on different pieces of personal body armour and helmet to see what the weight of operational combat gear was like. We were also spoken to by US Marine Gunnery Sergeant Ricky Farrell, he spoke to us briefly about the US Marines.

To end the day we finished with a photo on a Centurion Tank. 
