

Dear SHFLC Community,

It's been another busy and productive term, filled with a variety of programs and activities. I'm incredibly pleased to see our students continue to demonstrate their commitment to learning and their pursuit of meaningful pathways.

We are immensely proud of our students' diverse achievements across various areas of their learning. This term, they have gained confidence and skills through hands-on learning projects, excelled in horse riding, earned literacy awards, participated in art initiatives, and refined their musical abilities. Their dedication has also been evident in the classroom, where they have made significant progress and achieved positive outcomes in their academic studies.

We've had the privilege of the input and expertise of two local artists who have supported our students in the art space. In working with the students, they have completed both the common room mural and the Aboriginal art mural. Our community connections, whether with local Aboriginal elders, artists, mentors from the Pitstop program, or local businessmen, have significantly enriched our students' learning throughout Term 3. We feel fortunate and blessed to have such incredible support and expertise within our school.

This term, our students also benefited from a guest speaker from RoadSafe Goulburn Valley, who spoke on driver safety. Additionally, our school nurse has continued providing valuable sessions on relevant health topics, including sexual health, responsible alcohol use, and safe online media practices.

We've enjoyed delicious meals from the cooking groups, indulged in barista-quality coffee, and our students are now eagerly planning a Community Art and Music display for Term 4.

This term's excursions have been both meaningful and educational. We celebrated diversity and inclusion on Wear It Purple Day, supporting the LGBTQIA+ community, and will enjoy an enriching visit to Sea Life Melbourne in the last week of term. In addition, students have had valuable opportunities to explore future pathways and careers through various outings. These have included a visit to Puckapunyal, TAFE tester day and Winton Hands on Trade Expo. Valuable skills have also been gained from two short courses this term, First Aid and Construction Induction (White Card).

One of the highlights of Term 3 was securing a grant from Are-Able, which allowed us to employ David Vaughan, a local businessman from Euroa. He's been supporting our students one day a week as they plan and build a chicken coop for an Industry and Enterprise project, along with a shed for our gardening equipment. The students have gained invaluable experience from this project, and seeing our new resident chickens settle into their new home has been a standout moment of the term.

I'd like to extend my heartfelt thanks to our dedicated staff, who continue to teach, nurture, lead, and believe in our students with passion and care.

Thank you to our parents and guardians for your ongoing support, for encouraging your children to engage in our school setting, and for believing in our school's philosophy and values.

Lastly, a huge thank you to all the external agencies and services that have been part of the team working to help our students achieve their personal and academic goals.

Student Absences

Schools must:

- Have an Attendance Policy as part of their Student Engagement Policy
- Maintain attendance records
- Identify and follow up unexplained absences
- Record student attendance twice per day in primary schools and in every class in secondary schools
- Record, in writing, the reason given for each absence
- Advise parents/carers of unexplained absences, as soon as practicable on the same day of the absence, including for post-compulsory aged students.

NO SMOKING OR VAPING On this premises and within 4 metres of pedestrian access point to school entrance PENALIES MAY APPLY Humar WIT Please phone/text your student's teacher or reception to inform us of any student absences. If we don't hear from you then we are required to contact you.

In Victoria, a person must not smoke or vape on school premises or within 4 metres of any pedestrian access point to school premises.

The prohibition on smoking includes vaping and applies whether or not the e-cigarette contains nicotine.

Cigarettes and e-cigarettes cannot be sold to people under 18 years of age.

It is a legislative requirement that schools must display suitable No Smoking or Vaping signs at all pedestrian access points (entrances) to the school grounds.

The legislation defines smoking to include e-cigarettes.

Smoking and vaping are not permitted during school events and excursions held off school premises.

Mobile Phone Policy securely stored during school hours. For the purpose of this policy, a mobile phone is a telephone with access to a

Students who bring mobile phones to school must have them switched off and

cellular (telecommunication) system, with or without a physical connection to a network. Exceptions to the policy may be applied if certain conditions are met.

Exceptions can be granted by the principal, or by a teacher. Exceptions must

be documented.

Schools are required to develop a local policy on students using mobile phones, which must include how this ministerial policy will be implemented and may include other personal devices in addition to mobile phones.

Schools will manage non-compliance with their local mobile phone policy in accordance with their existing student engagement policies.

Schools should review their local policy as part of their regular cycle of review for school policies.

School Saving Bonus

Dear parents and carers,

In Term 4, 2024, families with a child enrolled in a government school from Prep to Year 12 in 2025 will receive the one-off \$400 School Saving Bonus.

The \$400 School Saving Bonus provides families with support for education-related costs, such as school activities and/or school uniforms and textbooks.

The School Saving Bonus is not available for full-fee international students, home schooled students, TAFE students and students attending kindergarten in 2025.

Actions for parents and carers

Before 18 October 2024, the Department of Education is asking parents and carers to:

Complete enrolment: If your child, or children are changing government school for Term 1 2025, or starting Prep or Year 7 in 2025. For more information, read about <u>Enrolling in School</u>.

Check your contact information: Ensure your email address and phone number is up to date with us. You can check this information by contacting us directly.

We need to ensure your contact information is up to date as the Department of Education will email you twice:

in October, to verify your email address

in November, with your \$400 School Saving Bonus and access to an online system.

Our participation in these conferences are important as we collaborate to improve our collective skill level and hear from industry professionals in their respective fields. This year there was around 600 educators in attendance. First Aid



The session also included an activity using beer goggles which simulate what it would be like to be under the influence of alcohol at different blood alcohol concentration levels. Students were asked to walk over or around objects, pick up objects, type a text message to friends while wearing the goggles to understand some of the impacts alcohol has on

the central nervous system as well as discuss the risks associated with binge drinking and decision making.
